Biography Note on Dr Jaydeep Sarangi

Dr Jaydeep is a renowned scholar, profound writer and distinguished academician. At present, he serves as the Principal of New Alipore College, West Bengal. As a teacher, Dr Jaydeep has had an experience of 30 years. As a researcher, translator and writer, he enjoys a never-ending journey. He interviewed great minds like Bama, Limbale and Kalyani Thakur. His important publications include Bangala Dalit Writer Writes Back, Subaltern Speaks: Selected Essays on Sharankumar Limbale. His expertise in subjects include Dalit Literature, Australian Literature and Literature of Aborigines. He is an excellent orator and the most humble human being who could inspire the students of Loyola College.

Dr K.S. Antonysamy's Briefing & Welcoming

Dr K.S. Antonysamy, the Head, Department of English, Loyola College, presented the dynamics of the Endowment Lecture by exploring the various aspects of Dalit Literature. He also had welcomed the Chief Guest along with others. Dr K.S. Antonysamy made a

perfectly befitting introduction for the occasion. Dalit literature, as he posited, is a body of texts produced by writers whose caste background used to be referred to as "Untouchable" or "scheduled caste", and whose writing engages with caste, caste discrimination, and Indian life from a Dalit point of view. After presenting the dynamics, he introduced the chief guest, Dr Jaydeep Sarangi. Dr Jaydeep is an academic superstar whose achievements speak volumes. He is truly multifaceted. He is a writer, translator and refined academician, based in Kolkata. He heads New Alipore College, West Bengal. Dr K.S. Our students had presented a few crucial excerpts from Dr Jaydeep's interviews with various writers from significant parts of India.

Snippet of Dr Jaydeep Sarangi's Lecture

Dr Jaydeep Sarangi's lecture focussed on three important aspects of Dalit Literature. The first one is how Dalit literature is contextual and at the same time, absorbs in itself universal appeal which in modern term can be defined 'glocal'. Along with the context, dalit literature is exponent of local culture and tradition which are richly building nation's heritage in every aspect. Secondly, he insisted how translation plays a vital role in assimilating such local culture into an international level. He reckoned students also to translate their own culture into English. He insisted that translation is a call to everyone so that our richly heritage becomes universally applicable. Thirdly, he highlighted how Dalit aesthetics is pervasive in our daily life. He elicited that Dalit aesthetics is our way of life by referring to the interviews he had had with aforementioned writers. Finally, he inspired the students to continuously write and engage themselves to become activists

by replicating leaders like Nelson Mandela, Abraham Lincoln, Dr Ambedkar, etc. He requested the students to read "Long Walk to Freedom" which opens their eyes to vast gamut of possibilities and positivity. Dr Jaydeep, as a writer, translator and teacher, is inspiring, illuminating and encouraging. His lecture is a timely topic to be discussed in an increasingly communal agitation in India. The Department is sure that it had attempted to make the students relish the words of Dr Jaydeep.
