



LOYOLA FORM FOR HISTORICAL RESEARCH REPORT

The Department of History at Loyola College, under the banner of the Loyola Forum for Historical Research (LFHR), organized a one-day national seminar titled "Voices of Change: Social Justice Movements in South India" on March 7, 2025. The seminar focuses to highlight the role of social movements and its impact South India since the 18th CE. The seminar was structured into three plenary sessions; each presided over by a resource person. These sessions featured paper presentations from faculty members, research scholars, and students from various colleges.

Inaugural Session





Justice K. Chandru, former Judge of the Madras High Court, graced the occasion as the chief guest for the seminar's inauguration. Dr. A. Arputha Selvi, the Head and Convener of the seminar, welcomed the attendees. The chief guest was honoured with a shawl by Rev. Dr. Arokiasamy, the Coordinator, and was presented with a memento by Dr. A. Arputha Selvi. Additionally, Dr. Biju Joseph, Assistant Professor in the Department of History, welcomed him with a fruit bouquet. Following this, Mr. Abdul Khadar, Assistant Professor in the Department of History, introduced the Chief Guest to the gathering. Justice K. Chandru then delivered the chief guest address.





Justice K. Chandru, the Chief Guest, reminisced about his college days and tenure as a Madras High Court judge. He highlighted the Prof. Rajaian vs. Union of India case to show how historical narratives are often manipulated by those in power. He also emphasized history's impact on social justice, citing the Mahar community's role in the defeat of Bahadur Shah II by the British as an example of marginalized groups' significant yet overlooked contributions. Justice Chandru encouraged students to adopt a broader perspective on history, stressing the importance of understanding it from multiple viewpoints to better grasp the present and future. He believed that this deeper understanding would empower them to contribute more effectively to social justice. The inauguration was ended with the vote of thanks delivered by Rev. Fr.Dr. A. Arokiasamy, Coordinator, Department of History, Loyola College.
