Introduction:

The Loyola Students Support Services (LSSS) is in its fourth year. LSSS provides financial, academic, medical and personal support to the students, particularly to the Dalit and poor Catholics, Orphans, Semi Orphans, Tribals, Srilankan Refugees and the Rural Poor students. It encompasses counseling, mentoring, tuitions, and host activities that would provide platforms for self-articulation and for enhancement on self-esteem.

1. Loyola Emancipatory Action for Dalit students (LEADS):

In accordance with the preferential option of the Jesuit Madurai Province, Jesuit educational institutions give priority to Dalit Catholics and other marginalized poor. As a visible expression of its commitment, Loyola College Management have set up Loyola Emancipatory Action for Dalit Students (LEADS) led by Dalit Coordinator..

LEADS coordinates with LSSS in all its programs. Last summer, it conducted EXODUS CAMP for the Tamil medium students to enrich their life and communication skills in English, by providing career guidance and English language training. 632 students had a residential programme from 28th April 2018 to 23rd May 2018. Among the 632 Exodus students, more than 150 students gained admission to study in Loyola College in various departments in June 2018. Oil and Natural Gas Corporation Limited (ONGC) supported the camp with a generous donation of Rs. 19.5 lakhs for 200 SC/ST students.

2. Academic Programme:

• Special English Coaching Classes (SECC):

LSSS organized Special English Coaching classes for the Tamil medium students in our college to enhance their academic performance during their first semester of undergraduate studies. Andrew Francis SJ, Principal, Loyola College.

• <u>US Microscholarship English Access Programme:</u>

'Access 2016-2018', a diploma programme funded by the Department of State, USA, ended in the month of May, 2018. These classes were conducted in partnership with ICDRCE. It was offered to the poor and deserving students of our college for 400 hours during the period of first two years. 60 students benefitted from this program.

Scholarships and Jesuit Educational Support:

Management Scholarship:

Every academic semester, Management provides fee concession through Jesuit Educational Support (JES) for the students who hail from economically poor family. Nearly 1.60 Crore rupees had been given as a management fee concession this academic year to 2600 students.

Other Scholarships:

- Sumittomo Corporation of India offers a scholarship to 15 deserving and meritorious students to the tune of 3 lakhs.
- Alumni Scholarship (1976'Economics Batch) offers scholarship to 5 deserving and meritorious students to the tune of Rs. 50000 (Fifty Thousand only).
- More than 150 students are benefitting from various other scholarships through the LSSS.

4. Art and Literary:

Art and Literary unit of the LSSS has the mission to provide platform for rural and tamil medium students to find their space and expression in Loyola social milieu through the rich cultural heritage of Tamil Nadu. It provides trainings in various art, craft and theatre forms of ancient dances and martial arts as well as it motivates students to learn, develop and promote such art forms. Around

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200 students are enrolled in art & literary unit and it conducts workshops and guest lectures periodically.

- Guest Lectures on every Wednesday. Topics Covered Imagination and creativity, Journalism, History of Transgender, Novel Writing, Story-telling, Importance of social volunteerism, Folk arts and songs, Street and demonstration theatre, Acting, Modern Tamil literature, Awareness on corruption, Advanced theater skills.
- Alternate media skill training on every Saturday.

In addition, LSSS had organized a four days residential camp for students at Chembarambakkam from May 7 to 10, 2018. 80 students attended the camp and were trained by folk artists from Alternative Media Center.

• <u>Veedhi Viruthu Vizha 2019</u>:

LSSS in collaboration with Alternative Media Center jointly conducted a two day cultural fest 6th edition "Veethi Viruthu Vizha" on 19th & 20th of January, 2019. It has been providing a platform to rural artists involved in performing various forms of ancient traditional dances and martial arts, to showcase their talents as well as motivate youngsters living in urban areas. One of the major objectives of this year's program is to bring such art form and artists in focus, to facilitate organisations including leading Corporates as well as Government of Tamil Nadu to support and promote these traditional and ancient art forms. Veethi Viruthu Vizha 2019 gathered nearly 4000 folk artists residing in all the 32 districts of Tamil Nadu including 13 tribal districts.

It was an occasion to recognize and to honor 500 senior artists who have been performing folk arts over several decades.

5. Mission with Gypsy Children:

LSSS works for a mission with gypsy children, which regularly visits gypsy settlement areas namely Guindy, Pallavaram, Meenjur, Kotturpuram, Ponneri and Thiruvallur to understand their socio economic and emotional conditions in order to serve these children in a more effective way. The main motto of this mission is to empower gypsy children with holistic development. LSSS has taken the initiative to enroll their children into the schools and it had found 16 children till this end. They were admitted in Ongur, Residential school, Uthiramerur for the free education through this Mission.

Under this mission, every year LSSS organizes **DESAM Camp** for the Gypsy children from the foresaid areas. Last year around 75 Gypsy children were taken for this residential programme for 10 days from 3rd May 2018 till 10th May 2018. Through this camp, they were given knowledge on health, sanitation, moral principles, Interpersonal relationships, motivation and verbal communication through the play way method. This camp had seen a tremendous growth towards children in their behavior & manner.
